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eSMART: Randomised controlled trial to evaluate electronic Symptom Management using the Advanced Symptom Management System (ASyMS) Remote Technology for patients with cancer

Recruitment Figures to eSMART




Figure 1 above shows recruitment to date in the study. The left-hand axis relates to the weekly totals (blue bars), while the right-hand axis relates to the overall totals (orange line). The dates when individual sites started recruiting to the study are shown, as is the duration of the recruitment pause. Up to the week ending 10th September 2016, we have 96 patients recruited to the study.

The <u>eHealth Forum</u> 2016 has been announced for the 25-26th of October 2016 in Athens, Greece. The eHealth Forum has a short but powerful history; In 2014 it brought together participants from 38 countries, organised under the Greek presidency of the EU Council and in 2015 it marked the first Greek event for the promotion of eHealth.

The organizers aim to make it the annual mhealth event for the Balkans, S.E. Europe and the Middle East. Kathi Apostolidis, ECPC vice President and representative of ECPC within the eSMART project is a member of the organizing committee and will be a speaker during the event in a session dedicated to mhealth in cancer care.
