








The Guarani Aquifer Agreement



 - ✓ Artigas/Quarai (U/B)
 - National implementation of good groundwater governance (transboundary implications?)

- The Guarani Aquifer System without the Agreement III (Added value of the entry into force of the Guarani Aquifer Agreement)
 - Official platform of cooperation can more easily attract national and international funding
 - An "institutionalised" official platform of cooperation can promote a regular exchange of good practices in the region (clearing house role)

Beacon of hope

 The experience of the Guarani countries was hailed as a landmark in transboundary aquifer cooperation

- The "political" challenges leading to the entry into force of the Guarani Aquifer Agreement are questioning such a landmark...
- The pre 2010 seeds of cooperation are still very much alive in some parts of the aquifer (border cities)
- The Guarani Aquifer Agreement as a regional platform of cooperation is still an endeavour worth pursuing
