This report has been produced by the Strathclyde Centre for Environmental Law and Governance (SCELG) and Scottish Island Federation (SIF) in the framework of their collaboration with the Islands Team of the Scottish Government. The goal of this report is to capture the essence of the discussions that have taken place at the consultation event on Gigha. The report will be sent out to participants who authorised us to do so in order to receive further comments and feedback. The report is not to be considered as an indication of what will ultimately go into the National Island Plan, but it will inform the latter. The report is also not to be considered as an indication of the position of Scottish Government on any of the points mentioned therein.









Introduction

On 21 May 2019 a consultation event took place on Gigha between 7:30pm and 9:30pm. The event was attended by 12 people and the goal was to capture both what works well on the island and the challenges faced by the community on Gigha. The consultation is required by the Islands (Scotland) Act 2018, as a means to inform the National Islands Plan that Scottish Government will be presenting to Scottish Parliament on 4 October 2019.

Gigha as a great place to live

The consultation highlighted the following things that make living on Gigha great:

- Great place for children
- Clean environment
- Community spirit
- Achamore Gardens
- Quality of life



Gigha is valued by the participants to the consultation event as a great place to raise children where safety, community spirit and, overall, quality of life stand out as great assets for those living on the island. Gigha is well known for the island community buy out that took place back in 2002. This led to a sense of empowerment on the island and is still today one of the aspects that Gigha is well known for.









Challenges on Gigha

The consultation moved on to discuss the current challenges on Gigha and the main concerns of the island community. The following are the main issues that were shared by the participants at the event (see Annex for more details):

- Depopulation
- Economic Development
- Environmental Protection
- Health and wellbeing
- Community empowerment
- Transport
- Digital Connectivity
- Fuel Poverty
- Land management
- Modern sports ground and facilities
- Art installations
- Heritage centre
- Education facilities from 3 to 60
- School upgraded











The National Islands Plan and the Response from the Participants

During the consultation, several key challenges were discussed in greater detail. We wish to make it very clear that a more in depth focus was undertaken for the purposes of the face-to-face consultation, and should not be considered as any indication of prioritisation in the framework of the National Islands Plan.

The areas discussed more in depth were:

- Transport
- Digital Connectivity
- Land management
- Environment

For each, participants were asked to provide more details about the challenge, their proposed solution, next steps, who should undertake these next steps and when. The following are the suggestions that we believe stemmed from the participants present at the consultation on Gigha:

Gigha Vision

Island communities know that good governance requires an integrated and holistic approach to policy. We wish to stress once again that the National Islands Plan and its implementation will not address specific issues in isolation, but rather will consider all factors together whilst taking into account their crosscutting nature. In addition, each island has its own unique character and its own unique challenges. From the consultation on Gigha we have identified the following specific traits to Gigha:

Firstly, the <u>community buy out</u> on Gigha has presented people on the island with tremendous opportunities. It has allowed them to take decisions that shape their future and to take their island forward. Gigha is actually an island that over the past 20 years has increased its population. However, the community buy out has also led to financial challenges that the people on Gigha are dealing with creatively but for which more action is needed. One area that was raised as problematic is the challenge in being able to sell houses under the market price, which is preventing young people from buying on the island. (<u>Renewable</u>) energy has clearly had a transformation role on Gigha. It has not only provided the island with green energy, but it has also provided much needed income to the island.

Secondly, <u>digital connectivity</u> is poor on the island and this prevents a plethora of activities, from pupils doing their homework properly to businesses to establish themselves and run from Gigha.









There needs to be a policy rethink of_digital connectivity not just as an economic service, but as an essential lifeline for the community.

Thirdly, <u>transport</u> on the island and from the mainland to the island has been highlighted as a challenge. Integrated timetables between ferries and buses on the mainland with thoughts on how to get people from the ferry slip to the bus in the village would be welcome. However, this challenge highlights a wider issue, which is about encouraging and putting place a forum (a place for discussing a solution to the challenge) where service providers, public bodies and users (island community) can meet effectively.

Fourthly, the <u>environment</u> is also what makes Gigha (and other islands) great. But not just any environment, a clean and healthy environment. People living on the islands feel that <u>waste management</u> should improve drastically, especially for large items. At the same time, the island may lose its character it too many cars come on it in the tourist season, so suggestions were made of exploring the possibility of making Gigha a car free island. This aspect of protecting the environment is heavily linked to improving transport, which could benefit from a community bus system. <u>Land management</u> is heavily linked to the environment, with participants recommending that more of the island is opened up to locals and visitors, but safeguarding indigenous flora and fauna.

One last comment was made about the need to make Gigha more productive. <u>Farming</u> was once much greater on Gigha than it is currently. One of the challenges here is the lack of a local abattoir. One solution that has been suggested is for a mobile abattoir to visit the island, which would allow farmers to locally slaughter their livestock rather than having to send them on lengthy and costly journeys. <u>Fish farming</u> is also being considered and, while it could provide much needed jobs (although it is unclear how many) and economic development, there needs to be a balance with the environmental concerns that activities such as fish farming raise within the population.
