Island: Stronsay

This report has been produced by the Strathclyde Centre for Environmental Law and Governance (SCELG) and Scottish Islands Federation (SIF) in the framework of their collaboration with the Islands Team of the Scottish Government. The goal of this report is to capture the essence of the discussions that have taken place at the consultation event on Stronsay. The report will be sent out to participants who authorised us to do so in order to receive further comments and feedback. The report is not to be considered as an indication of what will ultimately go into the National Island Plan, but it will inform the latter. The report is also not to be considered as an indication of the position of Scottish Government on any of the points mentioned therein.









Introduction

On the 2nd of July 2019, a focus group took place on Stronsay, and was attended by five people. The goal was to capture both what works well on the islands and the challenges faced by the community on Stronsay. The consultation is required by the Islands (Scotland) Act 2018, as a means to inform the National Islands Plan that Scottish Government will be presenting to Scottish Parliament on 4 October 2019.

Stronsay as a great place to live

The consultation highlighted the following things that make living on Stronsay great:

- Environment
- Opportunity to own land
- Education
- Healthcare
- Community
- Farming Culture
- Heritage



It is evident that there are many things that make Stronsay a fantastic place to live. The list above only affords a glimpse, but it does highlight that participants value the sense of community on the island, and that the culture and heritage that stem from Stronsay are integral to their identity as islanders. Additionally, the environment and the general quality of life on the island is considered as a positive contributing factor, with specific mention of the currently excellent standard of primary healthcare and on-island education, with participants stating that they would support a commitment to future proof these island services to ensure there longevity. The community also values the general environment of the island, and the scenery and wildlife it affords them.









Challenges on Stronsay

The consultation moved on to discuss the current challenges on Stronsay and the main concerns of the island community. The following are the main issues that were shared by the participants at the event:

- Stopping Population Decline
- Economic Development
- Community Empowerment
- Transport
- Digital Connectivity
- Biosecurity
- Housing
- Tourism











The National Islands Plan and the Response from the Participants

During the consultation, key challenges were discussed in greater detail. We wish to make it very clear that a more in depth focus was undertaken for the purposes of the face-to-face consultation, and should not be considered as any indication of prioritization in the framework of the National Islands Plan.

The areas discussed more in depth were:

- Housing
- Economic Development
- Transport
- Digital Connectivity

The following are the suggestions that we believe stemmed from the participants present at the consultation on Stronsay:

Stronsay Vision

Island communities know that good governance requires an integrated and holistic approach to policy. We wish to stress once again that the National Islands Plan and its implementation will not address specific issues in isolation, but rather will consider all factors together whilst taking into account their crosscutting nature. In addition, each island has its own unique character and its own unique challenges. From the consultation on Stronsay we have identified the following specific traits:









Firstly, participants made it very clear that achieving <u>sustainable economic development</u> was heavily reliant on the improvement of the current standard of <u>digital connectivity</u>, which is very inconsistent across the island. Although a 5G trial has been in place since February for a limited number of residents, and is hailed as a success by the participants, the longevity of this project has not been guaranteed. Consequently, although there are potential business opportunities on the island, specifically in relation to remote working and second jobs, these are currently unable to be utilised due to a lack of consistent and reliable connectivity. Improving digital connectivity would increase opportunities for employment, which would consequently encourage more people to move to the island.

In terms of <u>population</u>, it should be noted that Stronsay previously suffered from an aging demographic and that there was concerns regarding the closure of the school due to the lack of children on the island. However, largely due to the marketing of the island by the community themselves, the school population is now thriving with fantastic facilities in terms of education.

The <u>economic</u> landscape of the island could be revolutionised if the community was able to export its <u>community produced renewable energy</u>. The community has been very successful with its turbines, which fund a lot of projects such as kids school books, laptops etc. However, the turbines are currently heavily curtailed by legislation (70 -80%) and are therefore far from achieving their full, transformative potential. More renewable community energy support, to ensure that the island community benefit directly from the profits made, would allow more money to be invested in the community, by the community, and could have a ripple effect across all sectors.

Participants also indicated that they faced challenges in relation to the <u>housing sector</u>, with a lack of available, fit for purpose housing to rent and numerous vacant properties. Revising current housing policy to ensure that it creates locally affordable housing stock, with incentives to encourage the renovation of currently derelict properties, would be extremely beneficial for the community on Stronsay.









In terms of <u>transport</u>, the current infrastructure in place for ferries does not provide the necessary 'lifeline' service that the island communities are wholly reliant on. Participants indicated that the current ferry fleet was outdated and unreliable, and that there was a complete lack of public transport available on the island itself. There is a need to revise the transport sector to ensure that it is driven by island communities, and that it is fully recognized as being a 'lifeline' service for islanders rather than just an economic service.
