Admission

- 1. Notwithstanding the <u>General Academic Regulations Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level</u>, applicants shall possess:
 - i. a first or second class Honours degree in Social Science from a United Kingdom university; or
 - ii. a qualification deemed by the Head of Department acting on behalf of the Senate to be equivalent to (i) above
- 2. In all cases, applicants whose first language is not English, shall be required to demonstrate an appropriate level of English.

Duration of Study

3. See General Academic Regulations - Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level.

Mode of Study

4. The programme is available by full-time and part-time study.

Place of Study

5. The programmes are available on campus only.

Progress

- 8. Progress may be dependent on satisfactory performance against prescribed criteria outlined in the Programme Handbook.
- 9. The final award will be based on performance in the examinations, the coursework and the dissertation.

Award

- 10. Degree of MSc: In order to qualify for the award of the degree of MSc in International Relations, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 180 credits, of which 60 credits must have been awarded in respect of either the dissertation L2933 or placement dissertation L2974.
- 11. **Postgraduate Diploma:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Diploma in International Relations, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 120 credits from the taught modules of the programme curriculum.
- 12. **Postgraduate Certificate:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Certificate in International Relations, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 60 credits from the taught modules of the programme curriculum.
