Admission

- 1. Notwithstanding the <u>General Academic Regulations Postgraduate Taught Degree</u> <u>Programme Level</u>, applicants shall possess:
 - i. a first or second class Honours degree in a Social Science from a United Kingdom university; or
 - ii. a qualification deemed by the Head of Department acting on behalf of the Senate to be equivalent to (i) above.
- 2. In all cases, applicants whose first language is not English, shall be required to demonstrate an appropriate level of English.

Duration of Study

3. The <u>General Academic Regulations - Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level</u> <u>shall apply.</u>

Mode of Study

4. The programmes are available by full-time and part-time study.

Place of Study

5. The programmes are available on campus only.

Award

- 8. **Degree of MSc:** In order to qualify for the award of the degree of MSc in Political Economy, a candidate must have performed to the satisfaction of the Board of Examiners and must have accumulated no fewer than 180 credits, of which 60 credits must have been awarded in respect of L2933 Dissertation or L2974 Placement Dissertation.
- 9. **Postgraduate Diploma:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Diploma in Political Economy, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 120 credits from the taught modules of the programme curriculum.
- 10. **Postgraduate Certificate:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Certificate in Political Economy, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 60 credits from the taught modules of the programme curriculum.
