Admission

1. See the [General Academic Regulations – Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level](#).
2. In all cases, applicants whose first language is not English, shall be required to demonstrate an appropriate level of English.

Duration of study

3. Notwithstanding the [General Academic Regulations – Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level](#) the maximum period of study shall be as follows:
 - i. Master's by full-time study 36 months
 - ii. PG Diploma by full-time study 24 months
 - iii. PG Certificate by full-time study 12 months

Mode of study

4. The programme is available by full-time and part-time study.

Place of study

5. This programme is available on an attending basis only. In accordance with the [General Academic Regulations – Postgraduate Taught Degree Programme Level](#), some off-campus work may be required.

Curriculum

6. All students shall undertake an approved curriculum as follows:
 - i. for the degree of MSc no fewer than 180 credits including a 60 credit research project,
 - ii. for the Postgraduate Diploma no fewer than 120 credits,
 - iii. for the Postgraduate Certificate no fewer than 60 credits.

Award

9. **Degree of MSc:** In order to qualify for the degree of MSc in Political Communication and Media, a candidate must have performed to the satisfaction of the Board of Examiners and must have accumulated no fewer than 180 credits, of which 60 credits must have been awarded in respect of the Dissertation XXXXX.
10. **Postgraduate Diploma:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Diploma in Political Communication and Media, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 120 credits from the programme curriculum.
11. **Postgraduate Certificate:** In order to qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Certificate in Political Communication and Media, a candidate must have accumulated no fewer than 60 credits from the taught modules of the programme curriculum.
