

#### ACADEMIC PROFILE


#### Nicola Ferguson (2015-2016 Cohort), BA International Chinese Education, Tianjin **Foreign Studies University**

What did you study?

I graduated in the summer of 2021 with a Bachelors in International Chinese Education 汉语国际教育from Tianjin Foreign Studies University. I wanted to return to China to continue my studies but at that time student visas weren't allowed back into the country, so now I will return for work and possibly study again in a few years.

What was your undergraduate degree like?

My degree consisted of attending two types of classes, there was the mandarin lessons provided by the University for International Students (mostly were on scholarships for a year or two) and the other classes were my actual bachelor's classes that I attended with mainly Chinese Students that were also taking the same degree. The Bachelors





My dissertation focused on the differences and similarities between Chinese and Scottish festivals, e.g., Robert Burns Night and 端午节 Dragon Boat Festival. Since my degree was in attendance with Chinese Students as well, my dissertation had to be written in Chinese, which was very difficult to do during the pandemic.

How did the pandemic impact your degree?

In 2019 December my grandpa passed away, so I returned to Scotland for the funeral, missing my midterms and had planned to go back in February 2020. Unfortunately, my flight got cancelled the week of and everything went online. Regular classes were then at early morning hours here, some being at 3 am some being at 6am. A lot of teachers were wanting us to turn on our cameras and speak when I was lying in my bed, eyes closed just listening out for my name most of the time. Every time I could see a light change, I'd screen shot the slide and then close my eyes. Whenever I did finally actually wake up once classes were all over, I then had to go through all the screenshots and make sure I understood everything. It all got tiring and annoying but it's what had to be done. During the year and half that I had left of my degree, I had to sit two lots of exams for the midterms I missed and the end of term test in the same week, start taking my HSK 5 exam and then start preparing myself for the dissertation. Dissertation and HSK proved to be the worst thing for me, trying to write my dissertation in Chinese after being home for over a year and trying to pass the HSK test took me three attempts to pass. My Chinese level had plummeted from where I was conversing in Chinese every single day whilst in China, to now only speaking it when I was sometimes in Glasgow for dinner or talking to my teachers online.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to do a degree in China?

Although the Pandemic impacted my last year and half of my degree, the living and studying in China will forever be the best decision I ever made. The scholarship and whole degree continuously made me want to stay longer. I'm returning to China this month to begin working, thus proving how much China has been branded into my heart and mind, I couldn't imagine myself living anywhere else right now. Advice I'd give is to follow your heart, it's a massive step to move to another country never mind the other side of the world. Learn the culture, learn the language, and get yourself out there. Take yourself out of your comfort zone enough, it'll become your comfort zone, that's what I did. I will forever tell people to go abroad and live their life to the fullest. Go with an open mind so that you can fully enjoy and take in every single experience.

# Sorcha Rowan Kennedy (2016-17 Cohort), Executive Support Administrator, University of Reading


What is your job? What did you study?

I currently work for the Erasmus & Study Abroad Office at the University of Reading as the Executive Support Administrator. I spent my third year studying abroad at McGill University, in Montreal, Canada.

What led you to working in this job?

Every day can offer something quite different, which is an exciting part of working with so many international institutions. I could be helping out with the Pre-Departure Orientation for our outgoing students who are about to head off on their adventures abroad, or I could be planning trips to help our incoming students explore Reading and the UK. Otherwise, I could be creating social media campaigns, or supporting UoR staff on their Staff Mobility trips abroad to places such as Indonesia, Thailand, Italy and Spain. Of course, there is always paperwork to be collected and processed, so some time each day is dedicated to ensuring things run smoothly!

#### What is one thing you really like about your job?

I like to think that I can have a direct impact on a student's international experience, and I do my best to make it a positive one. The CISS Scholarship afforded us the opportunity to go abroad at the age of 17/18 – we were filled with youthful confidence and eager to get out into the world and explore. Not everyone has been granted that opportunity, and for many going abroad for an extended period of time can be intimidating and daunting. Within my role, I enjoy being able to offer students some reassurance and support them as much as possible, so that their experience is a little less overwhelming, and thoroughly worthwhile.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to pursue a career in this area?

Go for it! Have a look on University's websites directly - the field of international higher education is much larger than expected, and there are always opportunities popping up. Reach out to people on LinkedIn (we're a friendly bunch!) and ask for some advice or their account of working for a Study Abroad office, and you may hear of some different routes. If you are struggling to find a way in, consider working for a different department at a university, as you will gain valuable transferrable skills and experience. Most importantly, don't forget that your personal experiences make you a really valuable asset - CISS Alumni understand what it is like to call another country home.

# CHENGYU OF THE MONTH

脱胎换骨 tuo1tailhuan4gu3 - "reborn, remold oneself, turn over a new leaf"

Literal translation: "break free from one's placenta and change one's bones"

Background: Originally a Buddhist term referring to a monk or a nun obtaining enlightenment. Complimentary in meaning.

Example 1: 英国的经济增长方式太依赖金融业,工作没有后劲,在面对世界经济危机时,必须**脱胎换骨**,才能摆脱经济危机的影响。The British economic growth model relies too much on the financial sector, the industry has no durability; in facing the world economic crisis, we must remold ourselves; only then can we shake off the influence of the economic crisis.

Example 2: 结婚以后,在妻子的帮助下,他发生了脱胎换骨的变化,好像变成了另外一个人。After getting married, with the help of his wife, he underwent change as though he had been reborn, it appearing as if he had become another person.

#### **BOOK TALK REVIEW**

Kerry Brown, Sam Fowles & David Loyn: Does Power Inevitably Corrupt?, Edinburgh International Book Festival, 22nd August 2022, 5/5 stars

Three authors come together to discuss the question "Does Power Inevitably Corrupt", with a focus on China, the US and the UK.

Kerry Brown is the former Secretary of the Embassy of the United Kingdom in Beijing and is now a Professor of Chinese Studies and Director of the Lau China Institute at King's College, London. Sam Fowles is a barrister specialising in public and constitutional law who recently wrote a book called: "Overruled:



Confronting Our Vanishing Democracy in 8 Cases." David Loyn was a BBC foreign correspondent with the BBC for 30 years and recently wrote a book called: "The Long War: The Inside Story of America and Afghanistan Since 9/11".

The talk was fascinating and it was interesting to hear about China in the context of the UK and US governments. It easily could have been double the length, I wish it was!
