Dear friends and colleagues,

Welcome to the Winter 2022 edition of the CISS newsletter. We hope your winter is full of warmth and you are achieving the goals you have set for yourselves this year.

2022 marks the 10th anniversary for CISS. Over the past year, we held several events to celebrate a decade of achievements. Our hybrid Knowledge Exchange Conference on Mandarin Teaching has been a success, where we reflected on the teaching of Mandarin in Scotland. As CISS Mandarin teachers, we would like to take this opportunity to share with you Mandarin programmes we are running, how we work with schools and support our young people, our Chinese Exchange Teachers (VETs).

Discovering China is an innovative project that gives learners across Scotland opportunities to learn up-todate Mandarin language and culture. We offer a 10-week block of lessons to BGE primary and secondary classes, and year-long NQ classes for National 4, National 5, Higher and Advanced Higher Mandarin (Simplified). Learner achievement in all NQ presentations so far has been excellent.

This term, we have schools joining us from not just the north to the Borders, but also schools from remote islands. Wherever the schools are, we have always been communicating closely via Teams where the live-streamed classes, resources and sharing take place. We are working hard to ensure our teaching and learning is relevant to our lives and have been connecting our lessons with what is happening around the world.

Through our day-to-day lessons, our learners are able to develop all four skills – reading, writing, listening and speaking. Our classes are also going to celebrate 2023 Chinese New Year online, where pupils will showcase their learning and perform Chinese cultural activities. Keep an eye out for invitations.

We will shortly be promoting our online offer for 2023-24 with details of how to register your school's interest. Look out for our flyers arriving to your school inbox, and sign up to the SCILT weekly bulletin to make sure that you are first to hear about it!

We are very honoured that our roles at CISS are not just offering Mandarin courses, creating teaching resources and delivering online lessons. We have been supporting our PDOs with professional learning for CETs, VETs and CISS GTCS Mandarin teachers. We shared our perspectives on Mandarin teaching in Scotland, advice on working with Scottish colleagues and online teaching experience to our newly-arrived/newly-joined CETs and VETs in the induction sessions.

Under the leadership of our CISS PDOs, we have also formed a Mandarin Framework Working Group and Mandarin Teachers Steering Group in order to support the Mandarin teaching and learning in Scotland.

Looking back, we have overcome many challenges and gained lots of experience. Looking forward, we believe that through working with our partners and colleagues continuously, the Mandarin teaching in Scotland will elevate to new heights.

We wish you all the best and a joyful Christmas holiday and Chinese New Year when they come.


CHINESE NEW YEAR POSTER EXHIBITION AT EDINBURGH ZOO

LULU'S DIARY

Lu Dong, a teacher of English at Tianjin Shuangshui Middle School was posted to the Confucius Classroom Hub on Isle of Arran between 2018 and 2020 to teach Mandarin.

As the very first teacher of Mandarin on Arran, she was given the nickname "Island Empress" by the locals. Lu started writing a blog to record her life on the island soon after she settled in. During her time in Scotland, she wrote 66 blog posts that were then made into the book Lulu's Diary.

The books were published as part of the 10 year celebrations and will be sent round to all hubs for pupils and new CETs to hear a new teacher in Scotland's experiences and perspective on living in a different culture.



We are proud to say that Mandarin is continuing to flourish from Nursery to Primary 7 here at Cross Arthurlie Primary School. With the knowledge and guidance of our CISS Teacher, Jingjing Cao, we had another successful year last session and are excited about the year ahead.

We are continuing to utilise our Hub to strengthen and develop Family Learning as well as to continue to develop the Young Workforce (DYW). Recent learning interaction with parents and carers tells us there is high demand for these cultural cookery classes to run again this year.

The whole school came together to celebrate the Year of the Tiger with Chinese art lessons taking place across every year group. Each piece of art was inspired by the Tiger and was a collaboration including every pupil at Cross Arthurlie. Plans are now underway as we look towards the Year of the Rabbit in 2023.

Last session, pupils from nursery to P7 extended their ability to recall and identify vocabulary through excellent Mandarin language lessons with Cao Laoshi, who also led engaging learning in six other ERC schools. Further to that, the support of secondary cluster colleagues and the VETs meant Chinese language and culture learning experiences reached 14 primary schools altogether. This year's planning will ensure progression for all P5-7 learners in these schools, using a similar hybrid model.

Looking ahead, plans are currently in motion as we begin our Twinning Project with our partner schools in China. Our school has been paired with Mrs Cao's school back in Tianjin and we are lucky to have two other ERC primary schools (Maidenhill and Carolside) participating in the partnership programme. We are delighted to have this opportunity to enrich our learners' modern language skills and cultural awareness, as well as strengthen our collaborative work across East Renfrewshire Council.

Learning Mid-Autumn Festival vocabulary, passing small balls to practice Chinese new words, making delicious moon cakes, discovering charming legends and creating beautiful lanterns greatly attracted students. In class, we talked about legends, made moon cakes with clay, made lanterns with coloured paper, and experienced the customs of Mid-Autumn Festival.



Responding to the needs of students of different ages and interests, we have designed an optional topic of Chinese sports activities and Chinese traditional art. Children who like sports can jump rope, kick shuttlecock, count by Chinese numbers and experience traditional Chinese sports in the beautiful seaside playground of our school.




PEKING OPERA MASKS

MANDARIN IN S2

At Jordanhill school during the S2 Mandarin course we have learnt many things. We have learnt basic greetings, school subjects, days of the week, pets, order hobbies, of sentence structure, time, etc. We have learnt how to read these, write them, recognise them when we listen to them and to pronounce them in Mandarin. We have been learning all of these topics nice calm friendly in a environment.

Our teacher (Fu Laoshi) is very nice and encourages us to make the most of our revision and learning and may also occasionally give us a fun learning exercise to do like Gimkit. Gimkit is a website that allows you to play games with questions of whichever language you choose (similar to Blooket).

She also keeps track of how well we are remembering what we have learnt by giving us a weekly vocabulary test. In these vocabulary tests there are usually 6 questions each worth 5 marks and they are written in Mandarin characters, so we have to correctly translate these sentences into English. An example of a question would be 我上午十点半有数学 课。This translates to; At 10:30 AM I have a maths lesson.

We also sometimes have an assistant Mandarin teacher come in and we do speaking assessments. The teacher asks us questions in Mandarin and we give an answer to that question in Mandarin.

Usually at the start of the period we have a starter task to do were we have to look at the sentences in English and translate them into Mandarin in our jotters, or the other way around; we look at the sentences in Mandarin and translate them into English in our jotters.

MOON FESTIVAL PROJECT

P7's project was to make a poster about the Moon Festival. We could either do a poster, recipe, facts or the story about how the Moon Festival came around. Mooncakes play a big part of the festival. Mooncakes are usually made with salted egg yolk or 2 and a nice red bean surrounding. Beautiful patterns are normally found on top of mooncakes.

Homework for Chinese students. (中国学生)

Typically, Chinese students will get a lot more homework than UK students. Chinese parents are normally quite strict with their children wanting good grades and Chinese students normally spend 3 hours daily doing homework. That is twice the global average! China has passed a law blaming after-school tutoring and are planning to ban after-school tutoring. The media say that parents are being asked to manage their child's screen time and rest time to ensure that they are healthy. Around 85% of Chinese students suffer from stress from the amount of homework that they receive. Homework also has a strain on parents because with the amount of homework they get parents need to be constantly tutoring and constantly checking assignments, some parents are unable to do this due to their busy schedules which puts stress on both parent/parents and child/children.

Homework for UK students.(英国学生)

UK students get a lot less homework than Chinese students with 1hr 30min for 7 – 8 years a week. And 5 hours for 10 – 11 years a week. Genuinely, parents are less strict on their children. There are different types of homework that UK secondaries could include; learning, completing questions, researching, writing up, revision and reading ahead. Mainly UK homework is fairly relaxed but due dates are very important and late homework leads to punishment.

Education in China

Schooling in China consists of three years of kindergarten, six years of primary school, three years of junior middle school (also known as secondary school), and senior middle school (high school). After completing these years of schooling, students then can continue in higher education.

A growing number of Chinese students are choosing to study abroad when they reach the college level. However, at the elementary, middle school and high school levels, Chinese parents consider the Chinese education system to be the best in the world.


Extra curricular activities in China

NEWS FROM CET ZHAO RUI

ALLAN'S & ST. NINIANS PRIMARY SCHOOLS CELEBRATE MID-AUTUMN DAY

Since September 2022, the p7 pupils at Allan's and St. Ninians Primary schools have been learning Mandarin for the first time. So I decided to teach them Mandarin from two aspects: language and culture, so as to increase their interest quickly.

Fortunately, this year's Mid-Autumn Day was close to the beginning of the term, so it was a great opportunity to introduce them to Chinese life and culture. I organised a lesson to introduce and celebrate the festival. I used 'Secret Missions' to boost their confidence in learning Mandarin.

Because of their different personalities, I designed two kinds of tasks: one was for less confident children, and the others were for those who love performing.

The former had a paper-cutting task. They cut out paper mooncakes with different characters, and glued them on to paper plates in order (中秋节Mid-autumn Day, 团圆 family reunion, 吃月饼 eat mooncakes).

For those who love performing, designed different tasks: one aroup needed to research the history ofthe Mid-Autumn Festival and perform it in the form of a poem or create a rap; one needed aroup to research "the legend Chang'e of and Houvi", one aroup needed to research "The Story of Wu Gang Chopping the Cherry Bay", one needed group to research "The Story of the Jade Rabbit" and act them out in the form of a short play or a song or story.

Susan Lawson is the leader of the Mandarin team. She has so many great thoughts to help pupils learn Mandarin and Chinese culture. There is a Chinese Garden at Braehead Primary School, and they built a pagoda, a bridge, a stream covered with painted stones and a moon-gate.

In order to familiarise pupils with the kinds of plants that are typical Chinese ones and what kinds they can plant in their Chinese Garden, she organised a school trip to Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh. The staff introduced many classical Chinese plants and pupils wrote their ideas and drew their favourite plants. Through this trip, pupils had to brainstorm and make their decisions for their garden.

Susan Lawson carried out a film project to help pupils learn Mandarin for the whole country. She chose some topics, hobbies, such as sports, family members, food and drinks, selfintroduction etc. and hired some professionals to film. Pupils made up the settings, stories and lines for each topic. During the filming they were really focused. When I taught them how to pronounce each character, they did their best to speak standard Mandarin.

Last but not least, as a Chinese exchange teacher, with the help of Hongyu Li and Susan Lawson, I really appreciate this opportunity to experience teaching Mandarin in different schools and make much progress on adapting to different teaching systems and methodologies.


WEST LOTHIAN

BEYOND THE PANDA ON THE ROAD AGAIN!

This year, Beyond the Panda has been delivering in-person outreach again all across Scotland. However, the upper primary programme offers hybrid learning because there are great advantages to the multiple touch points which enables a progressive course. Four weeks virtual learning with the 5th week an in-person visit.

"Throughout the sessions, Sandie always linked the content (eg animals or habitats) to the Mandarin language - explaining the history of how the character was created which helped the children remember the character as well as the word." St. Charles' Primary, P5 In this course, wildlife related vocabulary is introduced but then the sentence structures are used to learn a simple introduction.

"They are still speaking phrases now to visitors and other teachers." Oyne Primary, P5-P7

Beyond the Panda, is definitely looking beyond the panda! With the new 'Giants' programme we compare two RZSS (Royal Zoological Society of Scotland) projects. The giant panda from China and the giant anteater from South America, also comparing the languages Mandarin and Spanish. 'Stripy Tails' due to launch in April 2023, will compare the red panda from China with the ring tailed lemur from Madagascar, linking Mandarin and French.

GROVE ACADEMY, DUNDEE

At Grove Academy, we in participated the SCEN conference at Kinross High School, singing a traditional song 茉莉花 (Jasmine Flowers) and reciting Li Bai's (李白) Quiet Night Thought (静夜思). Pupils and staff involved had a great time sharing our learning with the other participants.

Our cohort of Mandarin linguists is growing with all first-year pupils studying Mandarin, as well as a healthy S2 and S3 cohort and a handful of senior phase pupils. We hope that this growth will continue in coming years as we develop as a friend of CISS.

Our first-year pupils have been learning about the different sounds in Mandarin, learning a noun containing the sound as they go. This has developed into pupils being able to create imaginative sentences such as "我明天吃短吻鳄。" (Yesterday, I ate crocodile.).



Our S2 pupils have been learning to ask a wider variety of personal questions regarding personal information and appearance. This has led to S2 being able to play 'Guess Who' (猜猜我是谁?) in Mandarin.

S3 have been developing their skills around using dictionaries to become more independent learners. To gain more practice, pupils are translating short traditional poems and stories. They have also been developing their independent research skills, researching a Chinese city or region.

In December, 12 senior phase elective pupils will go to a local Chinese restaurant to try Dim Sum. This follows lessons in which pupils learned how to use chopsticks, Chinese dining etiquette and cultural norms.

We have also been focused on involving primary schools within our cluster. Mandarin lessons have been taught at Barnhill Primary where pupils have been learning about the Chinese Zodiac and animals, creating pictures from characters to highlight the story behind the character. Lessons will begin at Forthill Primary in the coming weeks.
